

WHAT DOES THIS REPORT COVER?

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Dear Friends,

Thank you all for another successful year. This past spring, we accepted a class of 54 students from Santa Clara and San Mateo Counties. In addition to providing our core services of scholarships, mentoring, college and career success trainings, and internship support, thanks to the generosity of many of you, we also continued providing students with other critical assistance, such as mental wellness support, emergency funds, and loaner laptops.



This past year was a critical moment for PCF as we engaged in significant capacity building. As a growing and evolving organization, we invested in building our infrastructure and strengthening our systems. In addition, PCF believes in reflection and constant improvement. So, we launched several exciting initiatives. Historically, PCF has served students who enroll in a 4-year college/ university straight out of high school. To meet the increasing number of low-income, first-generation students enrolling in community colleges, we launched a pilot to support approximately ten students who began their higher education careers at a community college. We are thrilled to collaborate with Santa Clara University and Evergreen Valley College to support five of these students in the coming years.

To accommodate our growth and to offer an additional level of support to students, we launched the PCF Online Learning Center (OLC) in July 2023. The OLC is a tool that students can access 24/7. It contains curriculum tailored to where students are in their college careers. It is a tool intended to provide students with the foundational skills necessary for college and career success so that PCF staff can focus on providing students with the individualized support that PCF students require.

For years, we have hosted the College and Career Leadership Conference for PCF scholars. This professional conference, which provides students with myriad workshops ranging from Personal Finance to Navigating Your First Year of College to Networking 101, was very labor intensive. This past June, we partnered with the College Success Collaborative, a local collaborative of twelve college access and success organizations, that recently began putting on a conference very similar to PCF's conference. This partnership enables us to leverage resources of other organizations while affording our scholars the opportunity to expand their networks.

On behalf of scholars, their families, alums, staff, and the PCF Board of Directors, I thank you for continuing on this journey with us. We recognize that we are able to do this work thanks to the dedicated community of donors, mentors, volunteers, and other supporters. Thank you for your ongoing support.


College success for PCF scholars can be measured by their persistence and 6-year graduation rate.


The persistence rate is the rate at which students return to an institution of higher learning the following year. The incoming classes of 2018, 2019 and 2020 were impacted the greatest by COVID, as illustrated in the graph below.

PCF's 6-year graduation rate of 87% stands well above the national average of 21%* for lowincome, first-generation college students who start at any 2-year or 4-year institution.



The Online Learning Center (OLC) was launched as part of the July 2023 College and Career Leadership Conference. The OLC is a vital component of our wraparound services, providing scholars with 24/7 access to information, resources, and their PCF peers to support their academic and career aspirations.

Serving as a central hub, the OLC, when complete, will offer a four-year curriculum tailored for first-generation students, including a comprehensive resource library that connects scholars to local support services to meet their immediate needs. To ensure the content is impactful and relevant, we continue to collaborate with PCF alumni to incorporate their valuable insights and experiences into this program.

The OLC is a multiphased project, and we are in the midst of Phase 1 for scholars. In the future, we plan to add a component for mentors.



College Success Collaborative Conference

This year, we proudly partnered with the College Success Collaborative, joining eleven other local organizations that serve students from underserved communities to host a one-day conference that unites our collective scholars.

The conference featured engaging sessions for over 300 scholars, with more than 30 speakers, including distinguished alumni. The program also included three inspiring keynote speakers, spearheaded by Antonio Lopez, Mayor of East Palo Alto. This was an impactful day for all who attended. Thank you to the many volunteers who supported this event.




As an intern at Valley Water, I developed and managed budgeting assignments, analyzed data, and tracked labor hours



Before the pandemic, 85% of seniors successfully secured internships. However, internship acquisition rates dropped sharply as the pandemic began. While we have seen a gradual recovery, progress has been limited. Since internships often lead to post-graduation job offers, our goal in the coming year is to strengthen partnerships with organizations and companies that offer these valuable experiences. Additionally, we aim to enhance our Scholars' hard and soft skills, equipping them to compete for and succeed in these opportunities.

PCF Post-Graduation Job Placement & Higher Education*



* These numbers represent placement rates at time of graduation.

Pre-pandemic, PCF college graduates secured post-grad jobs at a rate of 73% and enrolled in graduate school at a rate of 13%. In 2020, while the rate at which graduates enrolled in graduate school remained constant, the rate at which graduates secured post-grad jobs dropped to 31%. With the exception of 2023, since 2021 the percentage of graduates securing post-grad jobs has rebounded somewhat, though there is still much work to do! Today, college graduates continue to enroll in graduate school at lower rates than they did prior to the pandemic.





A Year of Growth and Connection for the Alumni Association

The Alumni Association had an exciting and impactful year, filled with a variety of events designed to bring members together and foster deeper connections. 







Percentage of Scholars Served by County






Operational Expenditures
